

As Yvonne said so beautifully:


"To all my colleagues, keep doing what you are doing. I will miss you all."

New equipment a big investment for the future

Norfolk Industries has purchased two new pieces of equipment that will improve efficiency and increase the safety of our pet bedding products.

The new compressed baler is much quicker than the old machine and will considerably speed up production of our flaked paper bales. It works in combination with a new metal detector which ensures all product on this manufacturing line is safe and contamination free.





The equipment supports a contract with a large UK retailer, and we see it as a big win-win.

As the new set-up generates product faster to meet customer demand, we now have three people working on this line - which means more paid hours to people with disabilities.

The increased production is good for business and could potentially lead to further paid employment opportunities for disabled people, which is central to our purpose. It also takes us another step closer to green goals of reducing waste and plastic packaging on our loose fill products.

Rachel's marathon challenge

We love sharing colleagues' stories and here, our Group Data Protection Officer, Rachel, tells us about an epic challenge she set for herself.

In the autumn of 2024, I found myself in the fortunate position of securing a place in the 2025 Boston (USA) and London Marathons. The problem being that these both take place in April and are just 6 days apart!

I've been a runner since I was 15, and been lucky to run the London Marathon in 2014, 2023 and 2024 but never attempted two so close together. I love a challenge, especially after turning 50 last August, and so in January 2025 training began.

Boston Marathon: 21st April 2025

The Boston Marathon is the oldest marathon in the world, with this being its 129th year. It is very popular and therefore difficult to get a place, with most trying to get their 'BQ' (Boston Qualifying) which means that you need to run a certain time for your age group.

The day of the race you convene on Boston Common to get a bus – the American yellow school buses, which we've seen in so many films - out to the start line in a little American town called Hopkinton. The bus takes an hour and the atmosphere is palpable, filled with nerves and lots of excitement!

The course is almost a straight line into Boston. It is undulating from the start, and then you hit the main hills from 17 – 22 miles! The support, encouragement and wall of noise for 26.2 miles still brings tears to my eyes. It was the hardest thing I've ever done but the most amazing too. Boston holds a very special place in my heart anyway, which has only been amplified by this amazing experience.

London Marathon: 27th April 2025

I reluctantly wrenched myself out of my beloved Boston and caught a night flight back to London, arriving on the Wednesday morning, which was just enough time to pop to Excel and collect my running number. I then had two days at home to recover from jet lag, have a massage, re-pack and get back down to London!

The London Marathon is a very special race to me too – and for my family. My parents were marathon runners and, when we were little, my sister and I used to watch them go to London and run the marathon. We always dreamed of following in their footsteps. I first did in 2014 and sis in 2015. Dad passed away in December 2023, so every marathon I run now, I'm partly running for him.

This year was a hot one! I knew as I was waiting to start that I would need to adjust my race plan and expectations. I just wanted to finish in one piece. My legs were heavy and sore, but I didn't care – I loved every single step, even the hardest ones.

The supporters in London are very special. Just thinking about it makes me cry. All the way round people are literally yelling your name at the top of their voices (having your name on your running top is a must!) and strangers become your friends for a few seconds. The noise takes your breath away.

I needed a short walk at 24 miles to have some Lucozade, but then it was back to it. Once you see Big Ben, you're one mile from home, then it's Birdcage Walk and The Mall. Crossing that finish line was emotional. There were tears! This challenge, which I'd thought about for so long, trained so hard for, was finally complete! I collected my medal, stumbled to get my bag and somehow found my way back to my hotel to recover.

I still can't believe it. Would I do it again? Of course I would!






























Attleborough Hub's Market stall
