PAS customer Emma has been volunteering at a local museum thanks to lottery funded heritage project, Kick the Dust.

I have a keen interest in history, I'm lucky to live in a history rich county. I love to learn and find interesting facts out about the places I visit. I have been to many historic places in and around Norwich.

I went to Strangers Hall in the summer of 2022 for the first time. I was fascinated by all the changes in the building over the centuries and how you can still see lots of them today. I enjoyed speaking to the volunteers in each of the rooms, they were able to give me detailed information about the building and family that lived there.





I enjoyed my time at Strangers Hall so much I revisited in autumn of 2023, on my second visit I asked if it was possible for me to become a volunteer. As it was coming to the end of the season, I was invited to apply for the Kick the Dust programme.

I was accepted and attended the induction day. All the volunteers were shown how to use the equipment and safely clean and preserve the historic exhibits. The programme ran for four weeks, I could only do the Thursdays. I was able to use the backpack hoover on the windows. Use dry paint brushes on the display fake fruit and the floor hoover with mesh on it to clean the plates.

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I would like to do more Kick the Dust programmes in the other museums next year, and I am still looking for opportunities to do more volunteering at Strangers Hall when it opens to the public again.

Meanwhile, Emma has a recommendation for us all to go out and visit the beautiful historic places we have in Norfolk.

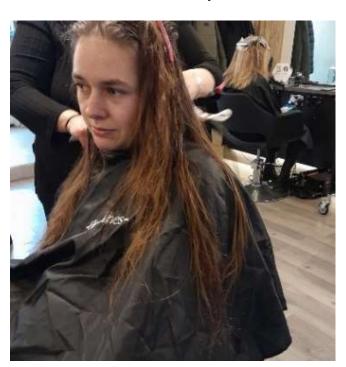
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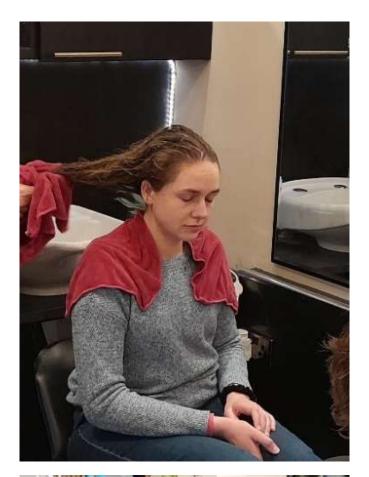
Emma's first ever visit to the salon

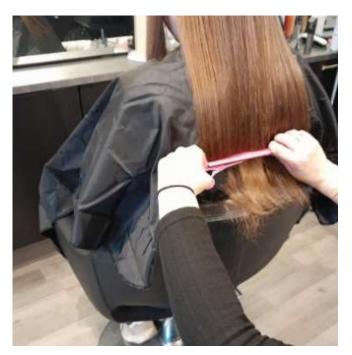


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I was still a little anxious about the process on my second visit but once we got started, I felt a little more at ease.

The seven attendees really enjoyed themselves and are looking forward to doing the next workshop on health and wellbeing later in the spring.



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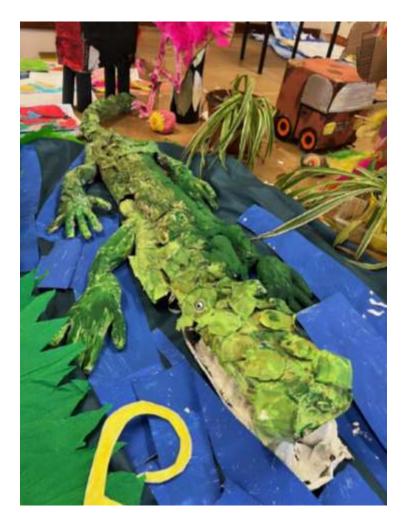
It's a jungle out there!!

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My husband has advanced Alzheimer's but only recently began receiving care from anyone other than myself, so it is a very new and strange experience for us both. Our two care workers treat my husband with dignity and respect and are professional. We never feel rushed even though I appreciate they are on a tight schedule.

They are always cheerful and chatty, talking to us both whilst providing care. They always remember the little details like my husband's football team and little sayings he repeats. If my husband is confused and a little worried about what is happening the care workers mention 'Millwall' or the boxing and it puts him more at ease.

Both care workers use a tone of voice with my husband that is both calming and reassuring. This continues throughout them assisting him to shower and settling him afterwards. I too enjoy our chats, as sometimes they are the only other people I see in a day. Being a fulltime carer is tiring and lonely at times. I wasn't sure how I would cope handing over my husband's care to someone else but I have no worries or concerns leaving my husband in their capable hands.

I'd like to nominate our care workers for their friendliness, their care and the way they interact with my wife, to bring her contact with women again which she loves. I feel warmth in their job and personal care. Thank you for excellent care.

Our care worker has
been wonderful. She always
comes in with a smile on her face,
makes us feel happy and makes us laugh.
She shows great empathy towards us
using her personal experience of disability
to deliver an excellent experience for us
every time she provides care. She goes
above and beyond. If she's having
a bad day we wouldn't know
as she leaves this behind
at the front door!

My care worker assists me to maintain a maximum level of independence, she listens to me and offers me good support.

These lovely Valentine's creations are all being made with love by customers at Crossroads Community Hub.





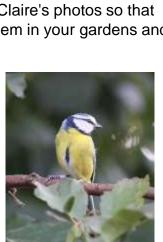
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TAPS wildlife blog

Hello everyone, Wildlife Watchers are back with a new blog. We're starting to see the first signs of spring in the air here at Dereham! Our pairs of blackbirds have had their first brood, we have seen a large fledgling being fed by both parents. We're sure there'll be more.



Some birds such as robins start nest building as early as January, and long tailed tits in early February. Magpies can start November and pigeons can be anytime. But most of our garden\woodland birds start in March\April, including dunnocks, bluetits, great tits, greenfinch, and chaffinch to name a few. We have shared some of Claire's photos so that you can look out for them in your gardens and on woodland walks.













Insects also started to appear in March. We've seen the odd bumble bee around as well as some butterflies (brimstone, holly blue and a red admiral) and some flies. In late March hedgehogs will have been waking up from their long sleep, and bats will follow early April. Badgers don't hibernate but spend more time underground in the colder months.

We're looking forward to seeing more baby birds, also the return of more butterflies and dragonflies. We will be making a moth trap but don't worry, they don't harm the moths, they fly into the light, then settle in the trap where we can get a closer look before releasing them.









Claire was excited to meet Hamza Yassin at the science festival in Norwich, where he did a very interesting talk about his wildlife photography and film work. He signed a picture for TAPS which now has pride of place on our wall, alongside Chris Packham and Michaela Strachan. He also signed Claire's copy of his book Be a Birder, which in a lovely little book about his life and over 50 birds.





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Most people know Hamza from winning Strictly Come Dancing 2022, but we all know and love him for his wonderful wildlife photography \ camera work and Countryfile. Claire said he was a very nice, friendly, lovely, knowledgeable man, and really enjoyed the talk.



We are spending some time at the end of our wildlife sessions reading a book called Wonderland, a Year of Britain's Wildlife, while googling the photos of each day. A nice end to our day!

We have lots of trips out planned this year and went on our first one at the end of March to one of our favourite places: NWT Cley & Salthouse Marshes. While there we were lucky enough to see an exhibition of the work of Robert Gilmore who lived in Cley from 1998 and produced lots of artwork from his time there.









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This brings us to the end of our blog, enjoy the new life and wildlife as we enter our favourite season. We'll leave you with some more of Claire's fabulous photos including these shots of a kingfisher taken at Cley.
