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Katherine is first Trainee Nursing Associate

HSM Field Care Supervisor, Katherine

Thornton, has been accepted onto the University of East Anglia (UEA) Trainee Nursing Associate (TNA) programme.

She is the first community-based TNA in Norfolk & Waveney, and HSM is the first home care provider with nursing provision to put a colleague through the course.

I'm so excited to be accepted onto the TNA programme! I always knew I wanted to train to be a nurse and when I qualify I'll become a third generation nurse as my grandmother and mum were both nurses. My Dad has also been in care all his working life, so I was brought up in a family that helped people, and this is what I wish to do.

On leaving school I applied for a temporary Christmas job at a card factory and stayed for six years - mainly because I had a young son and it allowed me to work around nurseries and early year schooling. When my son went to full-time school, I started working at a local nursing home as a housekeeper and hostess. After three months I moved into a care assistant role where I remained for two years.

It was whilst doing the care assistant work that a colleague mentioned she worked part-time for Home Support Matters on their Enhanced Home Support Service (EHSS). It sounded exactly what I was looking for, so I applied and was offered a place. I worked on the EHSS until 2022 when it was decommissioned.

I approached Su Carver, HSM's Care Delivery Director, in the summer of 2021 and asked if I could be considered for the Trainee Nursing Associate Programme.



I knew Su had various meetings with the Clinical Care Commissioning group, UEA and Norfolk and Suffolk Care Support, who all support providers to link into the programme.

The challenge for HSM was the need for the company to have a qualified nurse to be my mentor and an additional nurse to act as an internal assessor. Eventually it was agreed that Kerry Rey, HSM's Nurse Lead to be my mentor through the programme and Charlotte Hilburn, IM Trainer and Clinician Nurse, to be my internal assessor.

It was suggested I move into a supervisory role in preparation for the TNA programme, so I successfully applied to be a Field Care Supervisor and will remain working in this role throughout the TNA programme.

My interview with the UEA took place on 5th October and I heard later that day that I'd been successful. I'll be attending UEA once a week and working alongside my mentor Kerry Rey at least one day a week for the duration of the course. I am extremely appreciative of this amazing opportunity and cannot wait to get started!

A Day in the Life

Rebecca Keers is a full-time Co-ordinator for Home Support Matters. She supports with the day-to-day management of HSM's Community Care Support Service (CCSS), Supported Living, Learning Disabilities, and Norwich Rapid Response service.

Prior to this she spent over three years as a care worker in the Enhanced Home Support Service.

My day starts with feeding my son and my pony. One is always easier than the other, I'll let you decide which! I then make my way to the Beccles branch, unless I'm working from home, and set myself up for the day by logging on to check on my emails. One of the many things I love about my role is that it can be so varied and so different from day to day.

I spend a lot of time working on rotas and covering care and support visits for customers in Norwich and nearby areas. As an office team, we work well together to get other geographical areas and sectors covered, so you never feel on your own and there is always someone on hand to help. I also spend time talking and working with health professionals from across the care sector, taking on new customers and creating rounds into existing staff rotas. I work very closely with the Field Care Supervisors, who assess new customers, and together we build care and support rounds that enable individuals to live in their own homes as independently as possible. Customers needs change all the time and it's my job to notify Social Services to ensure packages of care are centred around each person's changing needs.

Admin tasks fill up a lot of my day; ensuring all care and support visits are attended by a care/support worker at the correct time, taking



phone calls from customers, their families and care and support workers, making sure that all information is passed onto the correct people or dealt with there and then.

Fridays are always a busy day for us Co-ordinators, making sure the weekend is covered before we leave off. I'm on call every other weekend, making sure the phones are answered, any issues are dealt with, and again making sure all customers receive planned care and support.

When I'm not working you'll find me spending time with my pony, Pauline, who is a rescue from Redwings, as well as spending time with my son. Having an office role has allowed me to build a work/life balance that works for me, with hybrid working meaning I can be at home when I need to be there for my son.

Not all disabilities can be seen

We recently experienced how difficult it can be for people with hidden disabilities when one of our work placements Ellen (not her real name) took on a paid, part-time role with a local employer.

The work was perfect for her, and we were confident it was a good match for her strengths. But what should have been a happy and successful outcome turned out very differently. Due to a lack of understanding of Ellen's disability and communication methods, she quickly became misunderstood, ultimately leading to her leaving her employment.

Situations like this can create anxiety and stress, dent confidence which might have taken years to build, and cloud disabled people's views of finding an understanding and accommodating employer.

We'd like to send Ellen every good wish for the future and just hope that she finds a more suitable opportunity soon.

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Helping Harry-Jay raise awareness

September is hydrocephalus awareness month and Harry-Jay's mum, a Team Manager at Ipswich Road Community Hub, asked us to help him raise awareness of the condition.



September is a very important month for me, every year my mum and dad do what they can to raise awareness, but now I'm older I like to do it myself (with a little bit of help).

Hydro is where there is too much fluid in your brain which causes the pressure in the brain to rise. This can cause brain damage and many other things. I was born with hydrocephalous; no one really knows why, it just happened. A blip in the system my mum says.

I had a very turbulent first few months, lots of hospital appointments and brain surgery at three weeks old. In my surgery I had something called a VP shunt (Ventriculoperitoneal Shunt) inserted. This is a pump that goes into my brain, it pumps all the fluid stuck in my head through a tube that is placed in my tummy. This keeps the pressure in my brain normal.

Now my mum and dad worry because the special pump can block which will then cause the pressure in my brain to rise. This always means a trip to a special hospital called Addenbrookes but luckily this has not happened yet where I need a new shunt.



I am a very lucky boy; even though my doctors still look for issues I am yet to have any, no brain damage, no disabilities. So, I have decided to raise as much awareness as I can for others who aren't as lucky as me.
