



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Adventure for dementia

A team linked to Independence Matters has taken on the Three Peaks Challenge in aid of dementia. The challenge requires the highest mountains in Scotland (Ben Nevis), England (Scafell Pike) and Wales (Snowdon) to each be climbed within a 24 hour period.

The team, led by Rosewood support worker Shani's husband, attempted the feat back in August and were suitably turned out in pink Independence Matters t-shirts and equipped with an Independence Matters flag to fly from the top of each peak.

Shani told us: "The boys started with the highest mountain, Ben Nevis, in awful conditions but powered through to the top. However, when they got to Scafell Pike a severe weather warning was in place and they were told no climbing, which put a big dampener on everything.







"They then travelled to Snowdon where two of the lads got injured, one made it 800 meters up before also getting injured. The travelling between each mountain was a feat in itself as their van broke down - it was like everything was against them."

Despite the setbacks, an amazing £3,785 was raised and the team would like to thank everyone for their support including Bar 1 in Gorleston whose donation bucket raised £250, and Daniel Sheales who matched this to make it £500. Thanks also go to Norfolk Vehicle Hire and Rex Camper Rentals for their support, fuel and transport, plus all the numerous friends and family members who donated via their Just Giving page.

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Harry's independence story

We love this story shared by PAS customer Harry who takes us on his journey towards greater independence

Before starting with Independence Matters, I was at Easton college studying animal care for three years. I had a meeting with my social worker Sue and my family, we talked about my future and my need to learn life skills and independence.

I was introduced to Lena from the PAS team. She came to my house and explained what the members of staff would do with me and how my days would look. I would have someone come to my house once a week and we would go out in the car to do activities. I felt excited and nervous about starting.

A few weeks later Lena introduced me to Andrea. Andrea spent time with me getting to know what things I'm interested in; I was very excited to meet someone new. I enjoy trying and learning new things. We plan what we are going to do next week so I have time to prepare myself. I am always ready for Andrea to come in and look forward to our days. I'm always happy and tired at the end of our days out.

I spent a few weeks getting to know Andrea, on some of our days out we tried to do activities, but it was card payment only. We talked about getting me my own bank account as I only had a savings account at this point. We checked online what I needed to take to the bank to open up a new account.

I found my passport and a letter with my name and address on which we needed as proof of ID. Andrea, and I talked about what type of account I would need and how I would use it.



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As I had never paid a bill or managed any money before we decided having two current accounts would be best. One named bills where my money would go into and bills come out, and the second and best one would be called Fun Stuff.

We took the bus into Norwich and went into Lloyds bank; the staff were very helpful and showed me how to apply for two new accounts. When filling out the form my birth date was wrong, so we had to do it all again. The staff were very kind and showed me the mistake.

Once I had done my part the staff had to scan my passport as proof ,then that was us done. The staff in the bank also helped me sent up online banking on my phone. When we looked at the clock, we saw it had taken us an hours and a half, thankfully we only had to do it once.

We rewarded ourselves with lunch. I then waited five working days for my cards to come in the post with the pin numbers. I keep my bills card at home and only use my fun stuff card. Once I had both cards and checked the pin number in the cash machine, I was happy to use them.

I have since moved money between accounts to make sure I have the money in the fun account for my days out. I have also gone online, booked and paid for a ticket for activities I want to do. Just last week I called up and paid my first mileage bill.

Andrea and I spent time talking about being safe with my cards and pin number by not sharing them with anyone and only using my banking app on secure internet. I enjoy having my own money and not having to ask mum and dad for cash all the time. My family are very proud of my me for going to the bank and sorting this all out. I also feel proud as this was something very new and has allowed me more independence.





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Part of becoming independent is to understand bus and train timetables and being able to use them safely. I have not used them before, so it was exciting and a little nerve racking to start with.

We planned the bus first, we looked online at the timetable and where it picked up, we worked out what time we could be at the bus stop and picked the best time for us. Waiting at the bus stop we saw people we know and had a chat. As the bus arrived everyone waiting started to move to the door, we waited a little because other people need to get off first.

I stepped on first and asked for two adults please as I don't have a bus pass yet, I use contactless to pay and took the tickets. We sat upstairs as we could see more and look in people's gardens. Andrea pointed out when to press the button to let the driver know we wanted to get off.

Once off the bus we looked round to find the bus stop we needed to be at for the journey home as it was on the other side of the road. I had worked out from the timetable which was the best time for us to get back on the bus and set an alarm on my phone to remind me 20 mins before we had to go back to the stop.

The timetables are difficult to understand, and I am still learning how to use them. We did the same for the train. I enjoy traveling by both and look forward to planning more trips. As part of getting round I am starting to use Google maps on my phone.



Andrea and I used it to find the bank but did get a little lost, we have practiced a few times and we are getting much better. While I was away on holiday, I showed my mum how it works by going to the library on my own.

Andrea and I have talked about safety when out and about and how to use location on WhatsApp. I also used this on holiday to find my way back to my mum and dad while they were shopping. I use my new skills all the time and my family feel a little safer now I have ways of finding my own way around.

Online publications spread the word

Our new contract with Bestpets got some great online coverage over the summer, being picked up by publications Pet Business World and Business & Industry Today, who each featured an advertorial.

Following an air quality survey, two new air benches (pictured left) arrived at the factory in September to improve the table extraction in our recycled production area.

Although the dust from recycled newsprint isn't harmful, it does settle onto surfaces and needs to be cleared away regularly. We already have overhead extraction in place as well as extraction directly over the shredding machines but wanted to improve the environment for our staff and people on work placements.

The air benches take dust away from the packing process and clean the air through filters fitted below the table surface. This ensures that the dust is not extracted past operatives faces and will reduce the amount of dust in the air within the enclosure. These are great extraction systems and we have already had one for our cotton production area for some years.




The forecourt at Norfolk Industries has had a transformation over the summer.

We had been experiencing an increasing number of problems due to people parking on the forecourt in the evenings and at weekends. These ranged from leaking oil, to blocking the roller shutter door, and even dumped cars.

Our solution was simple – we purchased five one-tonne blocks to put in place and prevent access when we are not there. The blocks are moved in and out using the fork truck and so far, have proved 100% effective!

And with the forecourt now reserved for Norfolk Industries use only, we were delighted when, after many months of negotiating and planning, we got the go ahead for the surface to be completely re-laid. This was a major operation as you can see, but what a massive improvement!




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Halloween Spooktacular!
